I'd like for anyone else joining the Bank and anyone else who's working in the Bank who may have additional needs to enjoy the kind of same benefits and the same culture I've enjoyed over the past seven years.

Flexible Working

The flexible working arrangement that I have where I can take every second Friday as parental leave. It means I get to spend time, currently more time with my youngest daughter because she hasn't started childcare yet, which is great. It gives my wife a break and you can get a bit more individual time with your kids.

I knew a little bit about the Central Bank anyway, and that's because I've worked in regulation for about 20 years in the UK. The decider though, was the fact that this role was being structured on a job share basis.
